OUR HISTORY

IN THE 1980s and 1990s, several Urban League affiliates recognized the need to prepare a new generation of young leaders to take the mantle of leadership of the Civil Rights Movement. Young African American men and women in their 20s and 30s were invited to participate in and take an active leadership role in their local affiliate Urban League programs and activities.

These new professional auxiliary groups began to operate as programs of affiliates in:

DETROIT, MI
The Blue Monday Network

CHICAGO, IL The Metropolitan Board

PHILADELPHIA, PA
Philadelphia Urban League Young Professionals

WASHINGTON, DC The Thursday Network

These auxiliary groups actively supported the Urban League movement by educating other young professionals about the movement, recruiting new members, furnishing young volunteers, sponsoring educational initiatives like youth mentoring and tutoring programs, coordinating fund-raisers for scholarships and for the financial support of the affiliate, and delivering personal and professional development and networking opportunities to young professionals in their local communities.

As these auxiliaries began to grow, the Affiliate leadership took note of their success and began to ponder the power of a national movement of young professionals across the country. Simultaneously, Hugh Price, then President and CEO of the National Urban League, realized the need to make this potential national movement into a reality. He held a historic "Young Professionals Dialogue Session" with over 200 young professionals in the New York area in April of 1998. This dialogue session, in addition to a white paper submitted by Marcus Mitchell, ignited the spark that led to the formation of a working group, tasked with establishing the framework and foundation for the

National Urban League Young Professionals. Under the direction of Annelle Lewis, Senior Vice President of Affiliate Development and Programs, the working group again convened in New York in September of 1998. Led by Marcus Mitchell (Philadelphia, PA), the working group consisted of:

They met on several occasions throughout the year to develop the foundation and structure of the implementation of the organization.

The National Urban League Young Professionals (NULYP) was unveiled at the 1999 National Urban League Annual Conference in Houston, TX. Marcus Mitchell assumed the role President and under his leadership the organization began to define itself and to carve out its role in the National Urban League movement. The leadership team met regularly to refine the structure of the organization as well as to develop its first draft of by-laws. Soon thereafter a special election was held to fill the open positions on the newly established NULYP executive board.

In 2022, the focus of the organization was to support Young Professional (YP) Chapters in developing agility during times of disruption and implementing effective leadership strategies. The year saw a return to inperson events and activations, both at the chapter level and national level, which brought excitement and engagement.

To help leaders navigate the changing climate and respond to the implications of the post-COVID era, the organization provided necessary tools and resources. The Executive Leadership Team (ELT) collaborated with national chairs to ensure timely delivery of programming, enabling chapters to plan and execute local initiatives effectively. Emphasizing transparency, the organization maintained clear communication about tasks and goals to foster accountability among National YP leaders.

Notable accomplishments and highlights from the year include:

- 1. 

VOTECOMING

Votecoming created a new opportunity within the organization establishing a partnership between our national and local Advocacy and Membership committees. This campaigned, fashioned after the HBCU experience, was designed to engage young professionals in the movement and to create a pipeline for membership and service on college campuses across the county. With a focus on registering voters and getting young people to the ballot, this initiative builds awareness around the advocacy work NULYP chapters do across the country.

The Votecoming Initiative 2022 witnessed several accomplishments. Across the country, NULYP chapters successfully hosted a variety of events centered around voter registration and engagement. These events targeted diverse populations, including college students, transplants and young professionals of all industries. By partnering with local colleges, hosting tabling events, attending homecoming events, and organizing candidate forums, the chapters effectively connected with individuals and sparked conversations about the importance of voting.

The impact of these efforts was evident in the metrics collected during Votecoming. Local chapters reported an increase in their membership numbers, with many new members joining during or shortly after the initiative. The accomplishments of the local chapters during the Votecoming Initiative 2022 exemplify our organization's commitment to empowering young professionals and promoting civic participation. These successes highlight the vital role NULYP chapters play in raising awareness about the advocacy work of the National Urban League and inspiring positive change within their communities.

The Urban League of Louisiana Young Professionals - Greater New Orleans recently organized the "Money Moves Baton Rouge" series, attracting 750 participants. This two-part event aimed to educate attendees on strategies for first-time homeownership, real estate investing, and commercial properties. The success of the series demonstrated the chapter's commitment to financial education and empowerment.





In another remarkable endeavor, the Urban League of Broward County Young Professionals Network raised an impressive \$40,000 through the "Minority Business Expo & Pitch Competition." 


























NATIONAL PARTNERS

Five NULYP Young professionals joined the 2022 One America Program cohort at the LULAC's National Convention in Puerto Rico to tackle the most recent extremist trends and complex challenges affecting the coalition's diverse populations.

Key Achievements

Hartford emerged stronger than ever by relaunching with a full Executive Leadership Team. President Holmes and Vice President attended the NUL Conference for the first time, eager to connect with fellow young professionals and contribute to the larger NULYP movement.

NEXT PHILADELPHIA

The Southern Region of NULYP has achieved significant accomplishments and demonstrated strong growth with 22 out of 24 established chapters actively contributing this past year.

The success of the region this year was proven by the success of the "YP Connect" 2022 Join Week event, which boasted a remarkable 70% attendance rate and received an overall rating of 9.3. This event provided an invaluable platform for young professionals to connect, network, and engage with one another.

Throughout the year, the Southern Region was well-represented, with 18 chapters attending National Conference, 3 chapters securing top 10 in the Diageo contest, and Arkansas YP Chapter emerging as the 2022 YP Fit Champions, highlighting their dedication to health and wellness initiatives within the region.





Additionally, the reactivation of the Birmingham and Chattanooga chapters signifies the region's ongoing efforts to strengthen its presence and engagement.

Looking ahead, the Southern Region is eagerly preparing for the 2023 Southern Region Conference, scheduled to be held in Atlanta from September 29 to October 1, 2023. This event will provide a valuable platform for collaboration, learning, and networking among young professionals from across the region.

Overall, the Southern Region of NULYP continues to thrive with its active and engaged chapters, impactful events, and commitment to empowering young professionals through professional development, community engagement and networking opportunities.

Chapter Highlights

ATLANTA

Urban League of Greater Atlanta Young Professionals held its 11th Annual Dream Catchers event honoring college-bound high school students and community leaders in metro-Atlanta. The chapter gave out \$10,000 in scholarships to high school students. Additionally, the chapter supported numerous Get Out The Vote activations during the 2022 Mid-Term Election cycle.

LEXINGTON

The Lexington Urban League Young Professionals hosted a Gun Safety Forum with "Armed & Educated" providing an in depth class on the basics of gun usage as well as do's & don'ts. A few members continued on to receive their CCW license. Additionally, the chapter has hosted "First Friday" event to fellowship as a community supporting as black-owned or minority-owned business each month.

ARKANSAS

The Urban League of the State of Arkansas, Inc. Young Professionals held its annual HBCU Care Package drive with support from Walmart as the champions of 2022 YP Fit. Through Walmart's support of roughly \$3,000, they are able to provide care packages and meet the needs of students at four HBCUs (Philander Smith College, University of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Shorter College and Arkansas Baptist College) and the University of Arkansas - Little Rock.

AUSTIN

Austin Area Urban League Young Professionals In September we had a Wealth Building Through real estate event that had a total of 35 attendees. Since then, we have had one member close on a home and another four members in the pipeline. We also had a VDR sign-up initiative in October in which we registered 10 VDRs.





BROWARD COUNTY

The Urban League of Broward County Young Professionals Network raised \$10,000 for first egnergation college students participating in our affiliates college tour program though our Young Professionals Empowerment Scholarship Fund. The chapter continued its Black and Jewish alliance with their American Jewish Committee colleagues, hosting a mixer during Jewish Heritage month and Caribbean Heritage Month. In September in collaboration with the Jewish Federation of Broward County's Young Leaders Division, the chapter hosted past member, State Senator Shevrin Jones for a conversation around how Black and Jewish young professionals can build community with each other and work together among our causes.

GREATER COLUMBUS

The Urban League of Greater Columbus Young Professionals - Red Table Talk was created as an opportunity to bring awareness to our five pillars of service: workforce development, education, housing, health, and social justice. Urban League Of Greater Columbus Young Professionals was afforded the opportunity to sit at tables with community leaders and CEOs. They were able to share their life journey of the past, present and, future.



CENTRAL CAROLINAS

The Urban League of Central Carolinas Young Professionals (ULCCYP) hosted its inaugural one-day professional development conference, PROPEL, in September 2022 with over 125 young professionals from the Charlotte, NC area and raising over \$10,000 in sponsorships and registrations. Speaker sessions included "Creating a startup for our entrepreneurs pathway", "Mastering Executive Presence" for our career chaser's pathway, and the art of networking with tangible info for everyone. Several sponsors signed on to support such as EY, UPS, Bank of America, AvidXchange, Ally, Atrium Health and Microsoft.

CENTRAL FLORIDA

The Central Florida Urban League Volunteered 12+ collective hours with local businesses and community partners during last summer's Blk Joy Festival. United more than 50 young professionals for a powerful networking experience during our quarterly mixer, hosted in collaboration with Lockheed Martin's Black Excellence Council. Raised \$300 during our November GBM, which also was our first fundraiser!

COLUMBIA

Columbia Urban League Young Professionals was a sponsor of its Affiliate's EOD Dinner for the first time ever! The chapter partnered with Toastmasters International to provide effective communication and leadership skills as well as the NAACP Legal Defense Fund to provide voter education register voters, and encourage early voting and poll monitoring.

DALLAS

The Dallas Fort Worth Urban League Young professionals focused its programming for 2022 in advocacy and service. Remaining heavy involved in community service, voter education and engagement throughout the entire year. Led by President Sean Reed, the chapter hosted it annual YP On The Road election forum and Annual Voting Day Party. Each event continues to show rising engagement among young professionals in the city. In May, sister chapters in Austin and Houston traveled to Dallas for the annual Texas YP weekend; a highlighted event was the State of Black Dallas.

HOUSTON

The Houston Area Urban League Young Professionals hosted State of Young Houston: A Fireside Chat with Houston Mayor Sylvester Turner, and moderated by Harris County Attorney Christian Menfee. The discussion centered around Policy, Economics, Leadership Development and the future of Houston. Also partnered with their community partners for the annual Christmas community service event: Operation Love. Operation Love provides clothes, shoes, christmas toys, resources, food and health check-ups for children and families in Houston. Each year the event services hundreds of families and is one of the most empowering events of the year with our affiliate on voter registration and education initiatives in preparation for last year's vital midterm elections. items collected during Holiday Giveback with Whitney M Young Academy.



JACKSONVILLE

Jacksonville Urban League Young Professionals - Hosted a public forum for Sheriff candidates in a special election, gained local media news coverage (August). Established partnership with the oldest HBCU in Florida (Edward Waters University) and Jacksonville University Black Student Union (September). Collaboration with 4 other young professional groups locally to expand young professional voices and service (November). Increased social media following on Facebook by 3% (December). Spoke to over 30 CEOs and Executives about the future of Jacksonville and what part our organization will play (December).

MEMPHIS

Memphis Urban League Young Professionals successfully launched its Well LIT Podcast featuring local black health professionals addressing various health concerns specific to the African American community. The chapter partnered with its affiliate and local news station to create the "Clean up Crew" hosting biweekly clean up events throughout the city of Memphis to address blight. For National Day of Empowerment, MULYP partnered with local



organizations to host a Coats for Kids Drive and Community Rally where over 150 coats were given away and families were provided resources to empower local residents to take back their community and build wealth through homeownership. The chapter was selected by the Memphis Grizzlies to be a part of their 901 Day celebration to share the mission of the movement, recruit members, and register local residents to vote.

MIDDLE TENNESSEE

Urban League Young Professionals of Middle Tennessee received a 3 year Community Grant in the amount of \$30,000 from the General Insurance. The community grant will be used to help advance the work our chapter is doing related to education equity, workforce development, economic empowerment, and affordable housing.

NEW ORLEANS

The Urban League of Louisiana Young Professionals - Greater New Orleans held a successful annual affiliate give, GiveNOLA Day. In addition, we continued our ongoing partnership (going on 8 years) with The Guild, "On the Money Tuesday" series with five financial seminars hosted in 2022. In combination of supporting several affiliate events: Big Health Event, ULLA Empowerment & Policy Conference, Money Moves New Orleans, Money Moves Baton Rouge, and See Change Initiative, the chapter collaborated with nationwide events including State of the Union Watch Party, National Day of Empowerment Virtual Activation, and Salary Negotiations Series.

UPSTATE SOUTH CAROLINA

Urban League of the Upstate Young Professionals assisted with the Village Launch in their tent-clean up drive. We packed up the event in 45 minutes flat! We also hosted our Back To School: Community & Family Day. We were able to provide bookbags, school supplies and raffle prizes to thousands in the Upstate of South Carolina.

WINSTON SALEM

Winston Salem Urban League Young Professionals In partnership with the Forsyth County Public Library, HUSTLE WS, Kaplan Early Learning and Girls on Fire, WSULYP hosted the first annual Lit Fair at the Boys & Girls Club of Winston-Salem. The event featured a book cafe, dream casting station, arts & crafts and a robotics station. The Lit Fair 2022 impacted over 125 kids, distributing over 350 books, and giving away 5 Chromebooks.

The Western Region of NULYP has experienced a renaissance, characterized by high levels of young professional (YP) engagement, robust affiliate support, and record-breaking turnout at the 2022 NUL Conference. This year we witnessed remarkable accomplishments and monumental growth, positioning the region for continued excellence and impact.

Chapter Support - The Regional Vice President (RVP) embarked on a journey, traveling to 4 chapters for in-person trainings, meetings, and retreats, demonstrating dedicated support to each chapter. Additionally, virtual events provided a platform for engaging with and supporting all chapters, ensuring their success and growth.

Regional Events - The region's collaborative spirit and commitment to knowledge-sharing were exemplified through 4 regional meetings. These events, including Ballots and Bubbly (a civic engagement conversation), a Careers Presentation with the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), a Pre-Conference Meet-up, and an Executive Retreat, which laid the foundation for fruitful discussions, networking opportunities, and strategic planning. These meetings served as a catalyst for the region's growth and set the stage for transformative initiatives.

Diageo Contest - The Western Region's outstanding performance in the Diageo contest is a testament to its dedication and drive for excellence. Fifty percent of the region's participating chapters, including Denver (1st place winner), Los Angeles and Phoenix, secured positions in the top 10 rankings.



National Representation - Another notable accomplishment is the increased representation of the Western Region at the national level. With a YP from the West now sitting on nearly every national committee, the region's voice and influence has expanded significantly. This increased representation ensures that the Western Region's perspectives, ideas, and expertise are actively contributing to the national YP agenda.

The Western Region is committed to inspiring growth, excellence, and transformation within its ranks. By fostering a culture of inspiration and support, the region aims to empower its members, drive innovation, and amplify their impact on local communities.

Chapter Highlights

DENVER

NULYP's 2022 President of the Year Ashlee Wedgeworth, embodies leadership in action and carries a deep responsibility for social justice and equity. She was selected to participate in NUL's Certificate in Advocacy program and is responsible for three Denver chapter leaders to serve on national committees, one of the highest group of chapter representatives in the West. Under her leadership, the Denver Urban League became the non-profit with the largest amount of volunteers in Colorado. Denver YPs made it their mission to give Black young professionals a seat at the table with opportunities to engage with policymakers and political candidates and lead important conversations around economic empowerment, marijuana equity and other advocacy topics. The chapter also provided hundreds of school supply items to youth at their annual Block Party. As the largest chapter in the YP movement, their activism, voice on key issues, and commitment to advocating on behalf of our community is unparalleled.

LAS VEGAS

Under the leadership of President Virginia Johnson, this chapter has maintained a consistent presence in the Las Vegas community and continues to be a force to be reckoned with. The chapter has nurtured YP leaders who have went on to ran for office in municipal and state elections in 2022. The chapter co-sponsored the Economic Summit and Student Leadership Conference alongside D9 organizations providing education around financial literacy and scholarships to youth. In addition to the summit, they hosted service days at the food pantry, rescue mission, high school giving pop-up and neighborhood park clean-up. Economic empowerment continues to be a cornerstone of their programming as they held a Money Moves general body meeting and auditing seminar for their members.



LOS ANGELES

Under the leadership of President Comfort Agara, the Los Angeles Urban League Young Professionals (LAULYP) has flourished and been hand-selected to activate in several NUL/NULYP events including the Black Executive Exchange Program launch event at the University of Southern California, the Chase Homebuyer Workshop and the host chapter for the Western Region Innovation Summit in 2023. President Agara traveled with a NULYP delegation to Puerto Rico for a leadership and advocacy training and Advocacy Chair Nicole Walker received an invitation from the UL affiliate to travel to and explore cultural influences in Japan. The team reintroduced their To the Nines annual fundraiser gala honoring young Black professionals and co-sponsored the TEC Leimert entertainment and tech conference. In 2022. the chapter secured 9 partnerships, contributed 8,000 service hours and increased membership by 45% with 121 members in total.





PHOENIX

Under the leadership of President Ashlee Atkins, this chapter had a tremendous level of impact and has remarkably changed the landscape of Black Phoenix with community empowerment and leadership development events. The chapter took its marquee event The Urban Expo to the next level by partnering with the Phoenix Suns - taking over their downtown arena with a full day line-up of programming. The chapter also continued their long-time YP CoNext mentorship and leadership program at Arizona State University (ASU) and co-sponsored events with ASU at the Congressional Black Caucus in DC. President Atkins was honored by the Phoenix Business Journal and Color Magazine with 40 under 40 awards. She also delivered remarks at a MLK rally with the Dr. King family, led her chapter's Juneteenth Freedom Week and co-sponsored NULYP's State of the Union Watch Party.

SAN DIEGO

Under the leadership of President Karla Sanchez, the San Diego Urban League Young Professionals (SDULYP) showcased perseverance and extraordinary dedication to the Urban League Movement and greater San Diego community. SDULYP leaders reignited their chapter with a diverse, interactive programming slate that included a wealth building workshop for National Day of Empowerment, home-buyer seminar, LinkedIn workshop and multiple STEM demonstrations and sessions targeted to teen girls and youth. They expanded their Executive Leadership Team (ELT) members significantly and invited the Western RVP to an in-person leadership retreat that would serve as a reboot for the chapter and newly recruited ELT members.

The Policy & Procedures Committee played a crucial role in ensuring the efficient and effective governance of NULYP and its chapters. By interpreting the NULYP Bylaws, creating and managing operating procedures, and facilitating the national elections process, the committee provided valuable resources and guidance to promote consistency and best practices across the organization.

Major accomplishments in 2022 included the development of essential resources and documentation for local chapters. This included the creation of a NULYP Bylaws Template and Checklist, which provided a standardized framework for chapters to establish and maintain their own bylaws in alignment with the



organization's principles. The committee also developed Suggested Meeting Procedures Guidelines to enhance meeting efficiency and effectiveness.

Recognizing the importance of fostering a safe and inclusive environment, the committee modernized the NULYP Harassment/Discrimination/Bullying Policy Document, ensuring it aligned with current best practices and reflected the organization's commitment to creating a respectful and inclusive culture. Additionally, the committee created a Corrective Action Document for NULYP RVPs and Chairs, providing a structured approach for addressing and resolving any issues that may arise within leadership roles.

To streamline the chapter chartering and activation process, the committee enhanced the 90-Day NULYP Chapter Chartering/Activation/Re-Activation Document, providing a comprehensive guide for chapters to navigate the necessary steps with clarity and efficiency. Furthermore, the committee developed an Electronic Communication Channel Etiquette Document to promote effective and professional communication practices within the organization.

Through these accomplishments, the Policy & Procedures Committee has played a vital role in equipping NULYP and its chapters with the necessary resources, documentation, and processes to govern their operations effectively. By the end of the year, thirty-seven Chapter By-Laws were reviewed, twenty-two chapters were trained, three YP Essentials and two regional training were facilitated by the committee. By promoting consistency, inclusivity, and accountability, the committee has helped foster a strong organizational structure that supports the overall mission and vision of NULYP.

The Advocacy committee has been instrumental in developing and implementing programs that inform and educate chapter members and the wider community about political and voting issues that have a direct impact on their lives and communities. The committee has achieved significant milestones in their efforts to promote awareness and engagement in various advocacy initiatives.

Key accomplishments include organizing MLK Day Voter Right's Activations in Phoenix, AZ, and Washington, DC, which focused on highlighting the importance of voter rights and participation. Additionally, the committee successfully hosted a State of the Union Address Watch Party, enabling members and the community to engage in discussions around important national issues.

The #SCOTUS WeFightforHer Campaign aimed to advocate for women's rights and foster gender equality in Supreme Court decisions, while the ProtectChoiceNow Reproductive Health Campaign focused on raising awareness and safeguarding reproductive health rights. The committee's work in 2022 remained dedicated to supporting and equipping local chapters with the necessary resources and tools to implement effective marketing strategies. The "YP Resource Hub" continued to serve as a centralized platform, providing easy access to activation guides, media toolkits, and programming resources. Additionally, the committee expanded the use of Canva as a medium to support chapter content creation, particularly in the absence of a local committee chair.

Recognizing the ongoing evolution of social media, the committee explored new platforms and emphasized the strategic use of LinkedIn to establish stronger connections with members and potential members. We explored developing landing pages for digital directories, such as the cookbook in partnership with the programs committee and the business directory as evergreen content, to provide access to valuable resources to the organization's community. The discovery of new assets, including reels and motion graphics, allowed for the creation of up-to-date content that effectively engages audiences through algorithm triggers. In 2022 our audience growth achieved 2,986 new followers across all platforms; the majority of growth occurring on Linkedin.


